California is Part of a Movement to Keep Families Safely Together

Mandated Reporting Reform

To move from the 14 Mandated Reporting to Community Supporting (MRCS) recommendations to implementation, an interim “Planning Team” was established by CalHHS, CDSS, and the PEI Committee. The purpose of the Planning Team was to fulfill Recommendation 1 by standing up the Mandated Reporting Advisory Committee (MRAC) in full alignment with the requirements set forth in the Task Force report. Per the recommendation, the MRAC is charged with ensuring that California’s transformation from mandated reporting to community supporting continues, and that disparities in the child welfare system are eliminated. To do this, the MRAC’s structure was intentionally designed to reflect the values of lived expertise, equity, and cross-system collaboration.

Key components include:

- Tri-Chairs were appointed, representing Lived Expertise, Systems Leadership, and the Child Welfare Council. The Tri-Chairs meet weekly to guide direction, coherence, and alignment across partners.
- A 36-seat MRAC was established, with ongoing commitments to lived expertise, racial equity, proximity to mandated reporting, and cross-sector representation. The MRAC meets monthly to build consensus and guide implementation.
- Five Workgroups, composed of members of the MRAC, were formed. The Workgroups are based on the “levers of implementation” that were stated in the Task Force report, and include: Data & Accountability, Training, Policy, Community Pathways, and Narrative Shift. Workgroups have been meeting at least twice monthly to develop detailed plans with specific objectives and deliverables.

This work has been made possible by a coordinated, committed partnership between CalHHS, CDSS, and the CWC’s Prevention & Early Intervention Committee, as well as public-private partners including CDSS, CDPH, Casey Family Programs, and Safe & Sound. Their shared investment has created an enduring backbone structure—allowing both the former MRCS Task Force and the current MRAC to focus on advancing systems change with lived expertise centered throughout the effort.

Policy Change Supporting the Shift

Assembly Bill 2085, passed in 2022, amended California law to ensure that poverty alone is not treated as “general neglect”—a critical step toward reducing the overreporting of low-income families, particularly those identifying as Black, Indigenous, and People of Color.

Senate Bill 119, signed into law in July 2025, established the Mandated Reporting Advisory Committee (MRAC) into law. It is the intent of the Legislature that the MRAC, whose members include cross-sector organizations and individuals with lived experience in family-serving systems, ensures the transformation of mandated reporting to community supporting continues and disparities in the child welfare system are eliminated. This law also requires the development of a new statewide mandated reporter training that incorporates content identified in the MRCS Task Force recommendations.

Our children and families make up a large part of the community. Many factors go into being a strong family, so we highlighted some tools you can implement to help cultivate a stronger family bond.

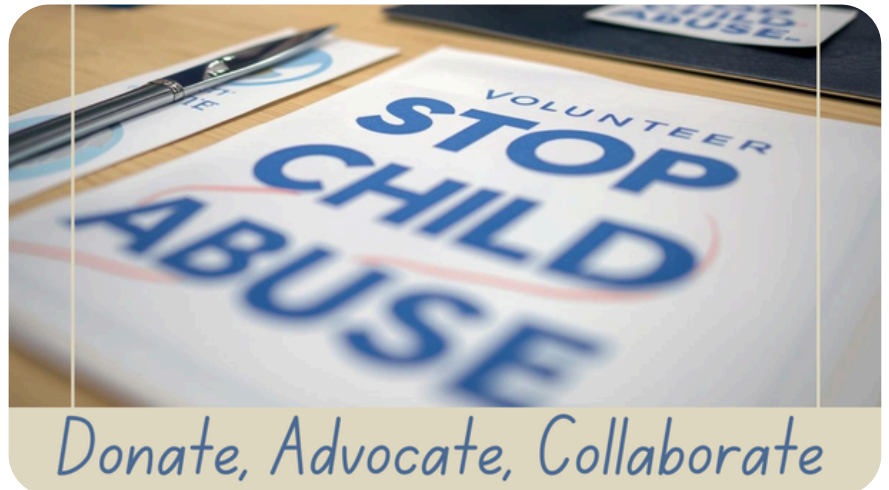
Please consider implementing some of these tips throughout National Child Abuse Prevention Month and revisit them often throughout the year.

- All feelings are valid. Learning to model and express feelings in a safe way, creates space for seeing and listening to your children. Kids are constantly growing and developing. Implementing protective factors into your family's routine can help with developing positive, healthy coping skills you can always turn to during times of stress.
- Parenting is not a solo act. Building a culture of support with other parents builds community and reminds people that they are not alone. Lending a hand and even accepting help from others shows our kids that asking for help is a sign of strength and encourages them to reach out in times of need.
- One in five children per year receives an unwanted sexual solicitation online. [Know2Protect](#) is a national public awareness campaign to educate and empower teens, parents, trusted adults, and policymakers to prevent and combat online child sexual exploitation and abuse (CSEA). - Helmets, seat belts, and life jackets save lives. Along with modeling positive emotional expression, modeling positive physical health is just as important. Being safe is cool! Kids look up to the adults in their lives, so when we have the opportunity to model these behaviors, the youth in our lives are more likely to follow our footsteps.

Local businesses and community organizations are essential for our communities. When we work together and collaborate, we are able to leverage our strengths and help our communities thrive. Please consider implementing some of these tips throughout National Child Abuse Prevention Month this April and revisit them all year long.



- Raise awareness of child abuse and neglect by setting aside a day in April to observe Child Abuse Prevention Month and celebrate your community's commitment to children and families.
- Share information and promote local community resources and events by hanging fliers or sharing social media posts.
- Team building can equal community building! Host a staff volunteer day, and bond over helping the community.
- If you see something, say something. We all have a role to play in child abuse prevention. Train your employees to recognize the signs of abuse and neglect and to make appropriate referrals. The CAP Center provides Mandated Child Abuse Reporter Training for free to the public, or can provide training to an organization for a fee. This workshop teaches mandated reporters their legal responsibilities to report known or suspected child abuse and neglect in California and how to make a Suspected Child Abuse Report. - Know more to care more: learn what protective factors are and how they prevent abuse and neglect. The CAP Center provides Mandated Child Abuse Reporter Training for free to the public or can provide training to an organization for a fee. This workshop teaches mandated reporters their legal responsibilities to report known or suspected child abuse and neglect in California and how to make a Suspected Child Abuse Report. 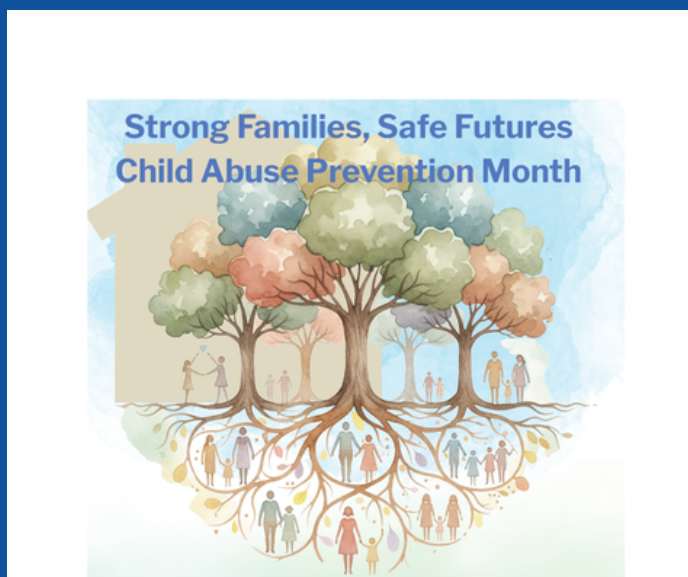

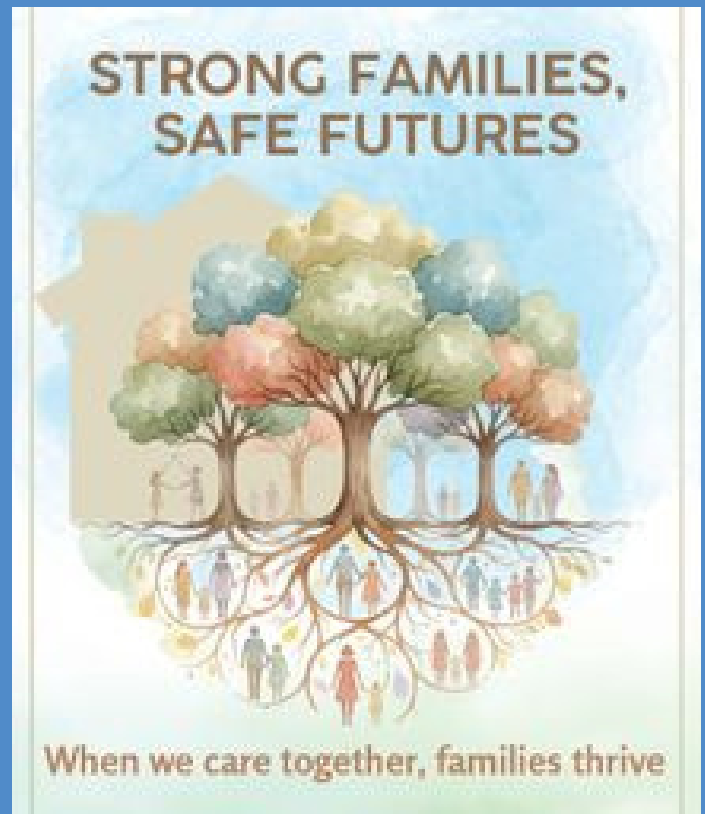
