#### I. Call to Order

Mary Butler Eggleston called the meeting to order at 5:31pm. Ms. Eggleston stated a quorum was physically present.

Ms. Eggleston welcomed Jennifer Sheppard and the Clinicians with School Based Services.

#### II. Consideration of Amendments to the Agenda

#### III. Approval of the Minutes

Approval of the amended minutes of December 15, 2025 Board Meeting were approved as submitted.

#### IV. Citizens’ Time

- Written comment received from Denise Tillack, South Anna District, regarding the hardship for those seeking telehealth services to have both audio and video access, as stated in the CSB Client Handbook.
- Lauren Lints, Ashley Hazelgrove, Isabel Kohuth, Lindsey Simmers, Ema Simpson, Mallory Talbert and Carleigh Boden spoke to the positive impact School Based Services as had in Hanover County Schools. They described “a day in the life” of a School Based Clinician, specific examples of positive outcomes while also mentioning potential consequences of losing such a program.

Mary Butler Eggleston thanked each of them for advocating for the program, expressing appreciation for all they have done.

Discussion ensued around the decision of the Hanover School Board to eliminate the funding of School Based Services. Sue Dibble stated it was a conscience decision based on statistical data, not just a budget issue. She went on to say the School Board believes it can continue to provide these services with current supports in place. Ryan Hudson stated he would like to see accurate statistical data. Discussion ensued.

Brett Schardein stated he and the CSB staff are working on retooling School Based Services. Ed Gooding asks if there had been an impact study around the proposed reduction in services; mentioning he, too, would like to see the data. Carol McDaid added that the CSB Legislative Committee will make this their priority, if they have the support of the Board of Supervisors. Discussion ensued.

Mr. Hudson proposed scheduling a work session March 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2026, to continue discussion around School Based Services.

Mr. Schardein reviewed the County’s strategies and objectives, referring to them as the “north star”. Mary Butler Eggleston called the Board work session to order at 5:30pm.

Ms. Eggleston welcomed everyone, expressing her appreciation of everyone’s dedication to this agency.

#### V. Board Work Session

School Based Mental Health Services

Mary Butler Eggleston turned the work session over to Bret Schardein. Mr. Schardein spoke to the circumstances effecting the decision of the Hanover School Board to discontinue funding School Based Services which includes changes in the budget/grants, which were partially affected by lower school enrollment. He also mentioned the School Board eliminated ten of their own positions. Ryan Hudson interjected that the ten positions would be eliminated through attrition, no one was losing their job.

Ms. Eggleston asked that the work session focus on moving forward, looking for clarity of the roles of the School Base Clinicians and the needs of the children of our community.

Sue Dibble spoke to the Board of Supervisors Finance Committee recognizing School Based Services needed to continue, but with fewer positions as the schools have other trained professionals in place. Funding is in place for three floating positions, plus one additional position which is only grant funded for one year. Discussion ensued.

Mr. Hudson stated not all Board of Supervisors, nor all School Board Members support eliminating School Base Services and that he will continue to keep pushing for more as he does not want to have a single child harmed. Ms. Dibble spoke to the Board of Supervisors having input on the total School Board budget, but not line items. The School Board's proposal was zero School Base Clinicians, but the Board of Supervisors Finance Committee has found funding for three plus one. Discussion ensued.

Ms. Eggleston spoke to the CSB offering the same services as it always has but School Based Services provides the opportunity to reduce barriers for children who would not otherwise engage in services. She went on to say that there has been a failure, and we need to make sure this does not happen again and perhaps even though this Board had never engaged with the School Board maybe this is an opportunity for that to change. Mr. Schardein commented that the CSB will build the best program around the positions we have. Discussion ensued.

Mr. Hudson restated the four positions are because of the Board of Supervisors, not the School Board. Ms. Dibble reiterated no one is losing their jobs and if it is determined they are needed back in the schools they will be moved back. Mr. Hudson asked if the staff was being moved into unfilled positions. Ivy Sager explained that the CSB has nine open positions currently, with one being clinical. She described the process by which the three effected staff will have the opportunity to express interest in positions as they become available.

Tawana Hampton spoke to feeling like the CSB is moving from preventative to reactive. Nathan Globig asked how to best provide the support needed in the schools with less staff. Ms. Dibble responded that the Board of Supervisors believes the support needed will be met by the floating four along the other staff within the schools. Discussion ensued.

Ms. Eggleston spoke to having a separate committee to connect with the School Board. Ms. McDaid suggested moving forward the Executive Committee ask for access to the data around services provided in the schools. Mr. Gooding inquired as to the recipient of the lost grant, suggesting contingency plans be in place for when grants go away. Ms. Eggleston said it was the School Board's grant. Ms. Sager confirmed the CSB was billing the School Board for the School Base Clinicians salaries.

Ms. Eggleston spoke to supporting the staff and community we serve. She went on to say if there is no way to keep everyone where they have been, there needs to be a means to be more present in the schools and to increase visibility. Ms. Eggleston added the Board is here to advocate but unfortunately, we do not have a solution for this. Ms. Dibble mentioned she would like to have Naloxone provided to every family in our schools. Discussion ensued.

Mr. Schardein spoke to an upcoming Opioid Task Force meeting as well as meeting with the School Base Clinicians in building the School Base Services program out. Ms. Eggleston asked

what can be done if the Board of Supervisors has no way to change the School Board budget line item. Mr. Hudson offered the County would need to fund it. Discussion ensued.

Ms. Dibble suggested a School Board member be a part of the CSB Board. Discussion ensued.

## Executive Director's Monthly Report April 2026

### Executive Director

Progress continues toward implementing the peer service program expansion. The Adult Outpatient SUD team visited Goochland Powhatan Community Services to learn about challenges and opportunities related to billing. The team is currently working with the reimbursement team to update the EHR and complete the final steps needed to begin billing.

Recruitment for peer positions has been challenging, as several promising candidates were disqualified due to barrier crimes, while others — though holding the CPRS certification — identified as peer allies without lived experience. To address workforce needs, HCCSB is proposing to create a Lead Peer Recovery Specialist position and upgrade a 0.5 FTE peer position to 1.0 FTE, using carryover funding and in anticipation of continued STEP-VA Peer funding. The proposal is currently under review by County Administration and Human Resources. In a related effort, HCCSB and County HR are collaborating with DBHDS to better understand current barrier crime legislation and its impact on administrative policy for CSBs.

HCCSB's Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) triennial accreditation was set to expire in Fall 2026. However, CARF extended the expiration date to May 31, 2027, due to high application volume. The next CARF review is scheduled for March/April 2027.

The Fee Schedule and Sliding Fee Scale will be presented for Board review at the June meeting. These documents were last comprehensively revised in August 2023. Board members are encouraged to review the [presentation materials](#) in advance and contact the Executive Director with any questions prior to the June 2026 meeting.

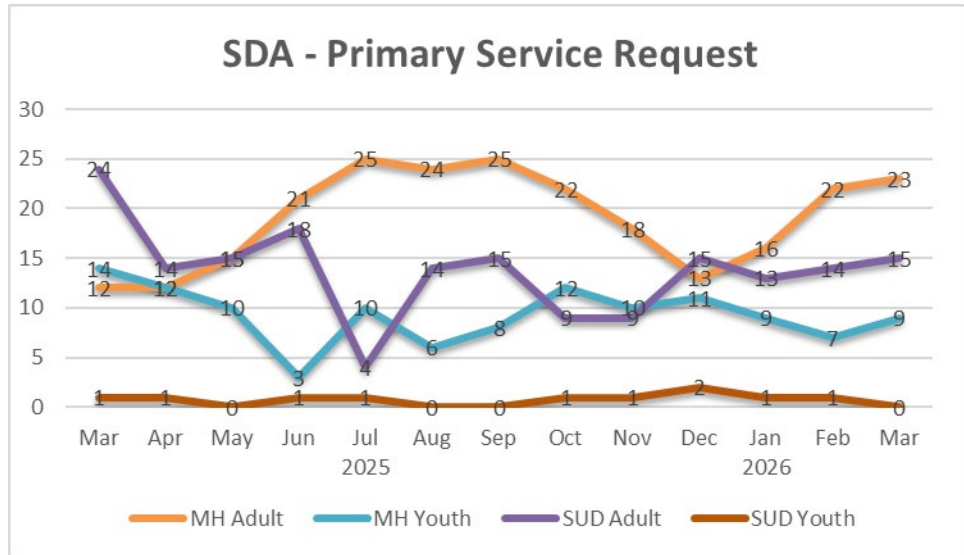
### Committee Updates

### Same Day Assessment for Services

In March 2026, individuals presented at the agency seeking services 64 times (54 unduplicated individuals). Of those, 47 completed a Comprehensive Needs Assessment and were scheduled for an initial appointment. 4 individuals were referred to crisis for immediate intervention. 4 were referred elsewhere for more clinically appropriate care. There were 8 occurrences in which the individual was screened and elected to return another day, 7 of them did so and are engaged in services.

The chart provides a visual of the primary service type for those who proceeded through assessment and were scheduled for their first appointment; the chart provides a rolling 13 months of data.

CSB staff submitted the **FY 2027 budget request** which includes the five-year plan (2027 to 2031) in October 2025. The County budget including CSB’s budget request was presented to the Board of Supervisors on February 18, 2026, and it is expected to be adopted on April 8, 2026.

CSB staff are working to **replace the lobby furniture** at Rt.1 location in Ashland and Bell Creek location in Mechanicsville. CSB staff have received a reason bid for replacing the furniture and are working with Finance to have the funding appropriated for the purchase. The estimated completion date is July 2026.

## **Behavioral Health & Wellness**

### Behavioral Health Wellness

The BHW team hosted the Blazing a Trail to Safety event in collaboration with the Hanover Sheriff’s Office, a Green Top Firearm Instructor, HCPS, and the Hanover Cares Coalition, which participated as a resource table. The Opioid Task Force continued its strategic planning efforts, with a focus on expanding access to naloxone in public spaces throughout the county. As part of this work, the Hanover County Library Director approved naloxone distribution at county libraries, where it will be housed in safety kiosks alongside other BHW resources — including gun locks, medication lock boxes, and medication disposal kits.

### Children & Adolescent Services

Members of the CSB and County Administration met with HCPS counterparts to discuss plans for adjusting the School-Based Mental Health program to align with the new staffing model. The Coordinator of Children & Adolescent Services subsequently presented the finalized staffing model to County Administration.

### Adult Outpatient Services

The mental health group continues to gain momentum, with six individuals participating regularly and several more slated to join in April. Outpatient teams remain focused on meeting DBHDS annual training requirements for evidence-based treatment models, with several clinicians leading the teams through training on four of the required models this month.

The SUD program peer represented HCCSB on the regional workgroup planning the 3rd Annual Regional Recovery Day event. The peer also visited Pamunkey Regional Jail to provide education to inmates interested in receiving Vivitrol prior to release. In addition to leading outpatient and RAFT groups, the peer provided individual support to 11 individuals this month.

### Adult Community Services

The new ACT Peer will join the team on April 16, 2026. Recruitment for the RAFT Peer position will be paused following three unsuccessful interview rounds. As an alternative, HCCSB will accept one

intern placement from the Region 4 Peer Recovery Academy, which is currently seeking placements across the region. HCCSB has a strong history with this program, having previously hired one intern and extended a job offer to another.

#### Emergency Services

As part of the DBHDS pilot, Same Day Access clinicians began administering problem gambling screenings to all individuals seeking services.

#### Medical Services

The prescribers completed 12 psychiatric evaluations and 160 medication follow-up appointments.

### **Developmental Disability Services**

#### Support Coordination

The Coordinator for Support Coordination participates in the Central Virginia Transition to Adulthood Coalition, which develops collaborative, multi-agency projects that make adult services easier to find, understand, and use. The Coalition is an informal, multi-agency advocacy and support group that meets three times a year with additional task force meetings tied to specific projects. This staff serves on the Focus Group task force tasked with planning and holding parent and self-advocate focus groups to learn more about their experiences with transition and using their information to develop additional resources for families. The first focus group was held at the “Life in Community” conference in November; they are working with the Director of Missions and Programs at Arc of Hanover to hold another focus group soon.

Staff participated in several trainings this month, including an in-service with DSS staff on Mandated Reporting. Staff also participated in a lunch-and-learn facilitated by one of the SC Supervisors, who provided an overview of the various audits for SC services, including Licensure, DMAS, SCQRs, and HSAG audits.

While the Division Director is out on medical leave, the Program Coordinator participated in the Regional Director’s Meeting and the state Developmental Services Council to ensure information and updates are shared with the team. The Program Coordinator met with the Executive Director of Arc of Hanover and the Coordinator of the Hanover Schools Parent Resource Department to introduce the new Intake and Outreach Specialist and to discuss how each agency can best collaborate to provide workshops and training

A Waiver Slot Allocation Committee (WSAC) meeting was held on March 10. The local WSAC combined two quarters, resulting in Hanover receiving 18 new DD Waiver assignments: 16 Family & Individual Supports (FIS) and 2 Community Living (CL) waivers. The regional WSAC met on March 25, and Hanover received five additional FIS waivers. The Support Coordinators began meeting with each of the 23 new waiver recipients to complete their acceptance documentation prior to transferring the individuals to support coordinators who will coordinate the waiver services and plan of care.

### Supported Employment

Supported Employment celebrated National Developmental Disability Awareness month with an agency wide email demonstrating the growth of the program. It also focused on the current employer and employee of the year, Oasis Management and Jill Atkins.

### Day Support

Program participants enjoyed a variety of activities including visiting the gym, cooking classes and seasonal arts and crafts projects.
